from Sept. 18 - 29 and marked the first iteration of the exercise since COVID-19.

"Our crews both on the ground and in the air challenged themselves to improve their skills, and they have clearly succeeded," Brig. Gen. Sarah H. Russ, PACAF mobilization assistant to the director of strategy, plans, programs, and requirements said. "These...days of practice and fellowship have improved both our Air Forces, and we are now better prepared for future missions."

Primarily a fighter centered exercise, CT23 focused on tactical mobility and provided an excellent opportunity to improve combined readiness and interoperability between the U.S. and Malaysia. It allowed for the exchange of techniques related to air superiority, tactical airlift and airdrop, military police practices, and tactical medical processes.

During the closing ceremony, RMAF Brig. Gen. Rozainy bin Ahmad Rapiee briefed on this year's exercise accomplishments, and stated that the exercise demonstrated remarkable dedication to the nations' partnership.

"Both Air Forces [were] able to collaborate to develop a comprehensive co-agreed operation procedure that will guarantee the safe and efficient conduct of combined air operations," Rapiee said. "It is essential to perpetually review and update the operation procedure to ensure that it remains relevant and valuable as the operational environment, capabilities, and requirements."

Total participation included more than 70 U.S. military personnel, F-16s from the 51st Fighter Wing, Osan Air Base, Republic of Korea, and C-130s from the Delaware Air National Guards' 166th Airlift Wing, New Castle Air National Guard Base, Delaware, alongside RMAF personnel, SU 30MKM, HAWK, F/A18D, C130H, A400, and EC725.

"I am proud of the many accomplishments during this exercise and believe strongly in the importance of our relationship," Russ said. "I look forward to further combined training opportunities in the future and for the many ways that we will continue to work together to ensure a free & open Indo-Pacific."

U.S. CUSTOMS AND BORDER PROTECTION AGENTS AID MANHUNT

Lockheed P-3 Orion Long Range Tracker parks at Delaware Air National Guard flightline Story by Mr. Mitch Topal, 166th AW Public Affairs

U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) dispatched an Air and Marine Operations (AMO) Lockheed P-3 Long Range Tracker crew to transport a U.S. Border Patrol Tactical Unit (BORTAC) team to Pennsylvania in an effort to locate and apprehend convicted killer Danelo Cavalcante. They arrived at the New Castle Air National Guard Base on September 7, where they joined Pennsylvania state and local law enforcement officers to continue the manhunt for the fugitive, who escaped from a Pennsylvania prison nine days earlier. The BORTAC team and an AMO Ground Tactical Air Controller (GTAC) agent who coordinated air support were instrumental in Cavalcante's dramatic capture while working with federal, state, and local law enforcement organizations on September 13.

This rare visit by a Lockheed P-3 Long Range Tracker is a historical first for the 166th Airlift Wing and turned some heads as it taxied into its spot on the flightline next to its cousin, the Lockheed C-130H Hercules. The Delaware Air National Guard is always ready to assist in multi-jurisdictional efforts to keep our state and Nation safe from both foreign and domestic threats. We were happy to provide a secure location for the P-3 while the agents prepared to apprehend the escaped criminal.

U.S. Customs and Border Protection, Air and Marine Operations (AMO) operates the P-3 Long Range Tracker (LRT) aircraft which performs a wide variety of operational missions, especially those that require long station time overhead, hemispheric range, and missions throughout all weather and environmental conditions. The versatile P-3 also serves as a force multiplier in joint operations with local, state, and federal partners for National Special Security Events and consequence management efforts.

The P-3 LRT aircraft is a high-endurance, all-weather, tactical turbo-prop aircraft. They are primarily used to conduct long-range aerial patrols and surveillance missions along the U.S. borders and in drug transit zones in Central and South America.

P-3 LRT aircraft often fly in tandem with the P-3 AEW. In order to take advantage of both aircraft's strengths, the P-3 AEW detects and tracks multiple targets and the accompanying P-3 LRT intercepts, identifies, and tracks those targets.

In Fiscal Year 2020, AMO P-3 crews contributed to the seizure or disruption of 111,134 pounds of cocaine.

Mentoring helps mentees develop new skills, become better problem-solvers, become better acclimated to their work environments, and have an example to look up to. For mentors, this is a great way to practice leadership and development skills. This mentorship program and all events are available to anyone interested in the Wing. The sign-up process is easy! Benefits of mentorship in the workplace for mentees include greater self-confidence, self-awareness, job satisfaction, and a great way to reach your goals. Benefits for mentors include greater self-confidence, improved communication skills, job satisfaction, and not to mention EPR bullets! Mentoring also benefits the Air National Guard and our Wing, by diversifying leadership, knowledge sharing, improved job satisfaction, and better retention rates.

Did you know in a five-year study of 1,000 employees (Gartner 2006), mentees were promoted five times more often than those not in a mentoring program, retention rates were higher for both mentees and mentors than for those who did not participate in a mentoring program. 84% said mentors helped them avoid costly mistakes, 84% became proficient in their roles faster, and 69% were making better decisions.

Trans-Atlantic Record Set

From the November 1969 DANG Truth:

ear the end of October a DelANG C-97 was the first of its kind to fly across the big Atlantic pond, non-stop. Commanded by Captain Judson Wooding, the plane proceeded to another first during the flight.

Stopping at Rhein Main Germany, to pick up a "corridor pilot" C-97 No. 928 flew to Berlin. This is one of the few times an Air Guard plane has ventured into this restricted airspace. Navigator Major Phillip Goettel helped pilots Wooding and Major Richard Hazell and 2nd Lt Craig Obeck effect the difficult approach into West Berlin. The landing entailed two passes over "the wall" to an airfield originally built by the Nazis during WWII.

Although the flight was a first, the plane's mechanical performance was less than first rate. After one abort because of a lost engine, the crew got in another plane (No. 928). Nine hours over the ocean a pump failed on engine number three and they had to depressurize the hydraulic system. With no hydraulic pressure they would have to make an emergency landing at Mildenhall, England.

A plane with no brakes, power assist to the rudder,

windshield wipers, and no steering on the nose wheel is not the easiest to land. Captain Wooding admitted that he was worried that night as he let the empty airplane down into the rain over London. As they approached Mildenhall, Major Hazell began pumping the hydraulic system by hand. Flight Engineer Roger Lambeth poured extra fluid into a small auxiliary tank by the co-pilot's seat. As Major Hazell worked the other crew members strapped themselves down.

The plane touched down the rainy runway and the engines were reversed. They stopped before a castering nose wheel complicated taxiing and the airplane was towed off the runway. The crew proceed to Berlin where they picked up a mock-up of the LEM module plus an Apollo 8 capsule. They headed south. Over France engine number two began to backfire. Touching down in Athens Wooten and Lambeth again climbed out to carry out repairs. They changed a carburetor and a cylinder. Captain Wooding said they would still be there were it not for the two engineers. Both men logged 80 hours CT time (overtime) during the eight-day mission. Dropping the displays in Tehran, Iran, for the Iran Trade Fair, The DelANG crew turned for home.


