Level Up: 166th Communications Squadron Connects the Mission at Home and Abroad

Behind the scenes, a newly designated unit ensures those missions run smoothly, no matter the location: the 166th Communications Squadron.

Recently transitioning from a communications flight to a full-fledged squadron, the 166th CS has amplified its capabilities and impact. They are the invisible force that enables communication

The JISCC, or Joint Incident Site Communications Capability, is a deployable communications kit that allows the 166th CS to establish remote network and radio capabilities anywhere in the world. This vital asset has played a crucial role in major events like Hurricane Katrina relief efforts, multiple presidential inaugurations, and joint exercises, demonstrating the squadron's commitment to supporting domestic operations.

The squadron's expertise isn't confined to U.S. borders. Several members recently returned from deployment to the Middle East in support of Operation Spartan Shield, showcasing their ability to excel in challenging environments. Adding to their list of firsts, three members were part of the Air Force's inaugural Expeditionary Air Base (XAB) A-Staff, setting the standard for future deployed personnel. Their experience is now shaping how the Air National Guard prepares for future deployments, with the 166th CS working alongside NGB A3/10 to establish XAB/DCW certification events for lead wings.



Technical Sgt. Marissa Christensen's decision to join the military was influenced by her father, who was active-duty Air Force before joining the Delaware Air National Guard towards the end of his career. His service filled her with pride, and she aspired to follow in his footsteps. During her senior year of high school, she IGETH MA grappled with the choice between joining the military or going straight to college. However, witnessing her brother's graduation from basic training solidified her decision to enlist. Additionally, being one of four siblings, she didn't want to burden her parents with the financial strain of paying for more than two diplomas.

Joining right out of high school, basic training was pivotal in shaping her confidence and resilience. It taught her to approach tasks one step at a time, instilling the belief that she could overcome any challenge. The structured environment and rigorous training ensured that she was well-prepared to tackle her responsibilities and contribute effectively to the mission.

Christensen started her career as a Crew Chief, specifically in the Repair and Reclamation section. Over the years as a Crew Chief, she earned the rank of Staff Sergeant. Eventually, she moved into the Maintenance Operations Center, where she was promoted to Technical Sergeant. She has supported multiple missions in locations such as Germany, Greenland, and Antarctica.

Christensen faced the challenge of balancing school and the Guard, as well as adapting to the switch from nightshift to dayshift during orders or drill weekends. A unique aspect of her journey was her decision to move from Texas, where she attended high school and her family resided, to live with her grandparents and join the DANG.

> As a nurse outside of the Guard, Christensen is currently contemplating whether to pursue a bachelor's degree and commission as an officer in either Aero Med or medical fields. Alternatively, she may choose to remain enlisted with the maintenance group. Her deep connection with her maintenance team makes it difficult to envision leaving them.

AIR FORC One quote that has always resonated with Christensen is Captain Miller's (Tom Hanks) line from 'Saving Private Ryan': "I don't gripe to you. I'm a Captain. There's a chain of command. Gripes go up, not down. Always up. You gripe to me." A message to other leaders and Junior Enlisted, "I think it is important not to lose yourself in your emotions around young airman or the people you lead. We are all human, we're going to have gripes and stressful/bad days, but it is important to control yourself and not take it out on those around you, and especially those that you lead, and on both ends, try to be understanding of how a decision came to be and/or trying to come up with better solutions if the decision is lacking."

Tech Sgt. Marissa Christensen's career in the Air National Guard has been shaped by personal determination and a commitment to excellence. As she continues to navigate her path, she remains grateful for the opportunities and experiences that have defined her journey.
