“We Take Care of Our Own”

“We Take Care of Our Own.” That’s the motto the Delaware National Guard staff and campers at Camp Colwell display on the back of their t-shirts. The camp, held July 21-27, 2013, provided a week long program filled with activities and field trips for Delaware National Guard children.

Camp Colwell is available to children who have a family member who is serving or has served in the Delaware National Guard. The camp is for ages nine to 17 and is located at the Delaware National Guard Training Site in Bethany Beach, Delaware.

“The camp is usually held the third week in July unless otherwise stated. The cost to attend Camp Colwell is only \$75 but if you deploy three months prior or up until three months after there is no cost,” stated U.S. Air Force Staff Sgt. Sylvia Dozier, camp security.

The camp also held its own military appreciation day, during which the students lined up in formation and greeted Maj. Gen. Frank Vavala, adjutant general, Delaware National Guard, upon his arrival on a UH-60 Black hawk helicopter from New Castle.

Gen. Vavala joined the children in demonstrating their skills on the Rugged Outdoor Pursuit of Education (ROPES) confidence course. ROPES courses are designed to promote team building and personal development through challenging outdoor physical activities.

“One of my dreams was to have something for the kids. Thirteen years ago I worked closely with camp founder Ernie Colwell to create something fun and positive for the kids,” said Vavala.

Campers at Camp Colwell spent part of July 24, 2013 going through team-building exercises at the Bethany Beach Training Site’s Rugged Outdoor Pursuit Education System. One event required the kids to pass one another on a log without touching the ground.

Besides learning cadences, formations and the ROPES courses, campers also traveled to the Delaware State Fair, Jolly Rogers Amusement Park, Rehoboth Beach, and watched *Turbo* at the theatre.

Returning camper 11 year old Alejandro Olivares stated, “I came back this year because it was fun and I like waking up early. I also like all the activities we do.” Alejandro is one of the many campers who had first-hand experience of a family member being deployed. Alejandro’s father, 1st Lt. Julian Olivares a flight nurse, returned home from a five month deployment to Kandahar, Afghanistan on June 10, 2013.

“All the staff members are to be commended because they donate their time

to work with our youth,” said Vavala. Third year volunteer Master Sgt. Jeffrey Longfellow, munitions chief with the 166th Airlift Wing, took military leave to volunteer at Camp Colwell. “I love being here and working with the kids. My own son started coming three years ago,” said Longfellow.

At the end of the week, the staff collects surveys from the kids to see what activities they liked the best or least and also to see what they can do differently or add to the program for next year.

80 guests visit base for first *Bring a Friend to Drill Day*

The unit's first *Bring a Friend to Drill Day* on Sunday morning, July 14, attracted about 80 civilian and prior service guests who were here to learn about the career opportunities and benefits available in the Delaware Air National Guard.

The guests asked questions about tattoos, physical fitness, medical conditions and evaluations, ways the military can further one's college education, the steps to become enlisted and requirements to becoming an officer.

The people asking the questions were a range of military-eligible young men and women who took the time to attend the unit's first *Bring a Friend to Drill Day*, a new initiative by the recruiting team.

The guests, from N.J., Pa., Del. and Md., came on base with some knowledge of the unit imparted from a friend or family member who informed them of the opportunity.

The variety of attendees was exactly what the recruiters were looking for.

Luke McFadden, age 18, from Bear, Del., is awaiting basic training and technical school. His technical school will be at Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas, where he will study aircraft electrical and environmental systems.

McFadden invited his friend James Tucker. Tucker is in the Associate Arts program at Delaware Technical & Community College, and plans to transfer to the University of Delaware. McFadden and Tucker completed high

school via homeschooling at about the same time.

Three females from Baltimore came at the invitation of Staff Sgt. June Squires, 166th Medical Group. Ms. Queoshay Dickens, now in nursing school, wants to become a cardiopulmonary technician in the medical group. Ms. Irina Pekarek, originally from Russia, was making her first visit to a military base. Ms. Christy Post, who is about to enter the Baltimore Police Academy, is interested in joining the aeromedical evacuation squadron.

Attendees were advised to start working out before they enter basic military training (BMT). Men and women have to meet set fitness requirements before, during and after BMT. "In the military, there is nothing gender specific except the bathrooms," said production recruiter Senior Airman Desmond Overton.

After attending the initial briefing, the visitors were taken to the flight line to tour a C-130 and view demonstrations by Explosive Ordnance Disposal, small terminal operations, aircrew flight equipment, propulsions shop, civil engineering, fire department, security forces, and the aeromedical evacuation squadron. They watched Airmen perform a variety of jobs, and heard subject matter experts talk about their part-time military experience.

Sexual Assault; Myths and Misconceptions

MYTH: Most/many/ a lot of reports of sexual assault are false.

FACT: The Department of Justice has consistently found the percentage of false reports of sexual assault to be the same as any other crime, between 2-7%.

The simple truth is, despite the anecdotes and stories that circulate on base and at bars, an insignificant amount of reports are found to be false. So the story you heard about the girlfriend getting back at her ex or the Airman who changed her mind after a night of drunk sex are just that — individual stories. These represent a fraction of actual sexual assaults that happen that you didn't hear about. Think about what that means.

MYTH: The way you dress and present yourself can lead to getting raped.

FACT: How someone dresses has nothing to do with whether or not they will be a victim of sexual assault. It is a crime of opportunity and the perpetrator is always responsible if they make the decision to harm a fellow Airman. Sexual assault is a crime of opportunity and the perpetrator is ALWAYS responsible for their actions if they decide to harm a fellow Airman.

MYTH: Guys don't need to worry about getting raped. Women are always the victims.

FACT: Based on the cases reported to the Veterans Administration, there are more male victims of sexual assault in the military than female. The majority of men who sexually assault or rape other men are heterosexual. In these cases, rape is about power and control, not sexual gratification.
