The Oct. 19-20, 2013 Unit Training Assembly for the 166th Airlift Wing is officially canceled.

Wing commander Col. Mike Feeley sent an Oct. 7, 2013 communication about the cancellation via a base-wide e-mail addressed to our "Delaware Air

National Guard Family." He wrote, "Because of the lack of appropriated funds, we are unable to meet our lead time for required financial planning. I understand the disruption to your lives, and the considerable financial hardship this may cause you. Your continued dedication and sacrifice is greatly appreciated. Your commanders have been given extreme flexibility in rescheduling your training."

As of Oct. 17, the October UTA has been rescheduled for Nov. 1, 2013 and Dec. 6, 2013, the Friday before each month's normally scheduled UTA.

Congress passes bill reopening federal government

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17, 2013 – President Barack Obama signed legislation late yesterday night bringing federal employees back to work after Congress finally resolved the budget logjam that led to a 16-day shutdown.

Senate leaders championed bipartisan legislation to reopen the government and remove the threat of government default on its debts. All federal government employees – including some 4,000 Defense Department employees – will report to work today.

The legislation is a continuing resolution that will provide federal government spending at fiscal year 2013 levels. This keeps the sequester-level budget in effect.

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Unit reaches 102 percent manning

Authorized strength milestone reached

The act will keep the government open through Jan. 15 and raises the debt limit through Feb. 7. The act contains a provision for a joint Senate-House committee to work on a budget recommendation for fiscal year 2014. Those recommendations are due Dec. 13.

The legislation includes the provision to pay all furloughed employees for the period of the lapse in appropriations. The act calls for those employees to be paid "as soon as practicable."

Even before the House of Representatives voted, President Obama signaled his intent to sign the bill. "We'll begin reopening our government immediately," he said in a White House appearance. "And we can begin to lift this cloud of uncertainty and unease from our businesses and from the American people."

Obama asked that all political officials take the lesson of the gridlock to heart and work together to solve the nation's problems.

"My hope and expectation is," Obama said, "everybody has learned that there is no reason why we can't work on the issues at hand, why we can't disagree between the parties while still being agreeable, and make sure that we're not inflicting harm on the American people when we do have disagreements."

"So hopefully that's a lesson that will be internalized, and not just by me, but also by Democrats and Republicans, not only the leaders, but also the rank-and-file," he said.

As he was leaving the Brady Press Room at the White House, a reporter asked the president if the shutdown might not be duplicated in January. "No," the president said and left.

Sylvia Matthews Burwell, the director of the Office of Management and Budget, said in a release federal employees "should expect to return to work in the morning."

Adopting the ‘MICT’; transitioning to a new inspection paradigm

“Mick-Tee.”

If you haven’t heard it around the office or shop recently, you will soon. The Air Force is transitioning from Operational Readiness and Unit Compliance Inspections to a new way of validating the readiness of its wings. It is a drastic change in how units will be inspected, but not in how they go about doing their mission.

The Management Internal Control Toolset (MICT) is a vital component of accomplishing and verifying unit readiness and performing self-assessment. MICT is a web-based program accessed through the Air Force Portal that includes a series of checklists a unit will use to report readiness. The checklists will include the unit’s functional areas, safety and administrative baseline tasks. It will allow leaders at multiple levels to assess where their units stand in terms of training, compliance, and performance.

“MICT will not cause us to do anything different militarily. We will continue to properly do the tasks we have always accomplished,” said Col. Michael Feeley, 166th Airlift Wing commander. “This is just a new tool we will use to grade ourselves.”

Like any checklist, tasks will be evaluated by answering yes, no,

or not applicable. But that is only part of the story. Any “yes” answers must be adequately supported with documentation that will be electronically uploaded into the program.

“No”, or non-compliant answers will require assigning a point of contact, a get-well date, and justification for non-compliance.

But “no” answers are not a reflection on a unit’s leadership. They are used to see what deficiencies a unit has and provide a path to correction.

Not making progress toward compliance or having a history of non-compliance could reflect poorly. Another feature of MICT is that it archives checklists, allowing leaders and inspectors to track performance over time.

The MICT self-assessment and inspection is half of the foundation of the Commander’s Inspection Program. The other half will be wing Inspector General personnel who will conduct unit inspections as directed by the commander.

In essence, MICT translates statements from various Air Force Instructions into questions. “The MICT checklists ask you, ‘Are you doing business according to AFIs?’” says Maj. Lynn Robinson, who is serving as the MICT program manager for the wing.

After conducting a previously scheduled operational readiness ex-

ercise, the wing began its transition to the new self-inspection model by focusing on MICT during annual training in September.

That training was focused on self-assessment program managers in units or shops, “anyone that has a guidon,” said Feeley. These managers will ensure units have the current checklists, assign assessors for specific checklist items, ensure items are documented correctly, and follow-up on the management of deficiency corrections.

The MICT helps program managers and leaders improve readiness and ensure compliance to AFIs by identifying deficiencies, then providing a place for answering why they exist, a course of action to correct, and a suspense date for correcting them.

The goal of the new Commander’s Inspection Program is to get away from an inspection model that created the potential for units to do business one way, then do it another way for inspections, and afterwards go back to old bad habits.

Under the new system Air Mobility Command Inspector General members will inspect a unit virtually, using MICT, on any given day on any given month of any given year. The goal is to ensure units are doing business every day the way the Air Force wants it to be done, not just in time for an inspection.

Air Guard flight nurse inducted into Delaware Aviation Hall of Fame

The induction of the first flight nurse and the first member of the 142nd Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron into the Delaware Aviation Hall of Fame will occur Oct. 19, 2013. Recently retired Maj. Rogelio Rodriguez, Jr., will be inducted along with five other members of the Delaware aviation community during the DAHF annual honors banquet Saturday, Oct. 19, at the University of Delaware's Clayton Hall in Newark, Del.

According to a DAHF news release (website: www.dahf.org), Maj. Rogelio Rodriguez, Jr., a resident of Bear, Del. and an aeromedical evacuation flight nurse in the Delaware Air National Guard, logged over 150 combat missions and almost 700 combat flying hours transporting over 2,000 wounded to needed medical care during Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom. He has 25 years of military service, 14 years as a nurse.
