Walker, currently the wing's vice commander, earned his commission through the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md., graduating with distinction in 1989. His first operational tour was onboard the nuclear powered attack submarine U.S.S. Montpelier (SSN–765), on which he served as combat systems officer and qualified as chief engineer. Walker served as the first deputy program manager of the Satellite Artificial Intelligence Laboratory and as master instructor of Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering at the U.S.N.A.

Christman is the director of Joint Cyber Operations with the Delaware National Guard Joint Force Headquarters, and a master cyber operations officer assigned to the 166th NWS.

Have outrageous camp prices ever stopped you from sending your kids to summer camp?

The Children of the Delaware National Guard Camp Cowell is open to dependent children of the Delaware Army and Air Guard for a fee of \$50 per camper (no fee for children of deployed parents) and \$75 per junior counselor.

Building camaraderie and having fun through structured activities is what Camp Colwell provides for Delaware Guard youth. The one week camp held every July at the Bethany Beach Training Site can provide for up to 80 campers ages nine-12, and 50 junior counselors ages 13-17.

Campers keep busy with a schedule that includes team building and life skills, computer time, arts and crafts, and canoeing.

Campers experience military-style activities that their parents have experienced such as marching in formations, having platoon leaders, and working in teams on obstacle courses.

The campers also enjoy field trips to local attractions such as the Delaware State Fair, the Air Mobility Command Museum at Dover Air Force Base.

Camp Colwell is a 501c3, non-profit camp and is licensed through the State of Delaware. It runs

only on donations and is led by camp director Kim King and a five-member board of directors.

The camp was founded by retired Master Sgt. Ernie Colwell, who started it 15 years ago and continues to serve as director emeritus. His mission was to provide Delaware National Guard youth a quality summer camp and foster a sense of well-being while forming bonds with other military kids.
